

The National Seminar on BUILDING BRIDGES ACROSS IDENTITY POLITICS forms the academic component of a larger FESTIVAL OF PEACE, which the staff and students of the Arts faculty of Wilson College have initiated, as an annual event since 2014. Besides the seminar, the Festival of Peace has a session of student paper presentations and other student activities like drama and dance competitions, quizzes, painting and drawing competitions, beach football, essay and poetry writing competitions, etc. All these activities are based on the theme of Building Bridges.

THEME NOTE:

We are at the crossroads of many conflicts stirred up by a turbulent mix of peoples, histories, ambitions, purposes, needs and development. Identities are in a flux becoming nebulous and contentious issues. Tidy national borders are no longer sufficient to bring about a sense of oneness

Often social and political groups are oppressed on the basis of their membership. One's identity (being a Dalit, or a Black or a Kurd or a Palestinian or a Woman or Gay) makes one particularly vulnerable to (Casteist, Racist, Ethnic, National, Gender, Homophobic) imperialism, violence, exploitation, marginalization or powerlessness.

Living in a factitious world we are becoming increasingly intolerant with each passing year. While our world is globalized in terms of economics and technology, our socio-cultural psyches have remained parochial and are becoming more so. Making the headlines on daily basis are hate-crimes based on violence against minorities, women, children and people with alternative orientation.

While in the past, politics was played across ideology, today we see an emerging identity politics across caste, class, ethnicity and nationhood. The notion of identity has become indispensible to contemporary political

discourse, but at the same time it has troubling implications for models of self, political inclusiveness and the possibility of solidarity and resistance.

Marginalized groups often embody distinctive values radically different from those of the larger and dominant mainstream and IDENTITY POLITICS reflects the shared experiences of injustice on members of the oppressed group. This results in indigenous rights movements, regional self-determination nationalist projects and gender rights etc.

BUILDING BRIDGES, an interdisciplinary conference wants to explore new forms of collaboration across the divide of political identities, ethnic, economic and social conflicts and gender inequalities.

This conference gets together, thinkers, academics, and activists from across India to help craft an agenda for the future on inclusive, pluralistic and liberal lines.
